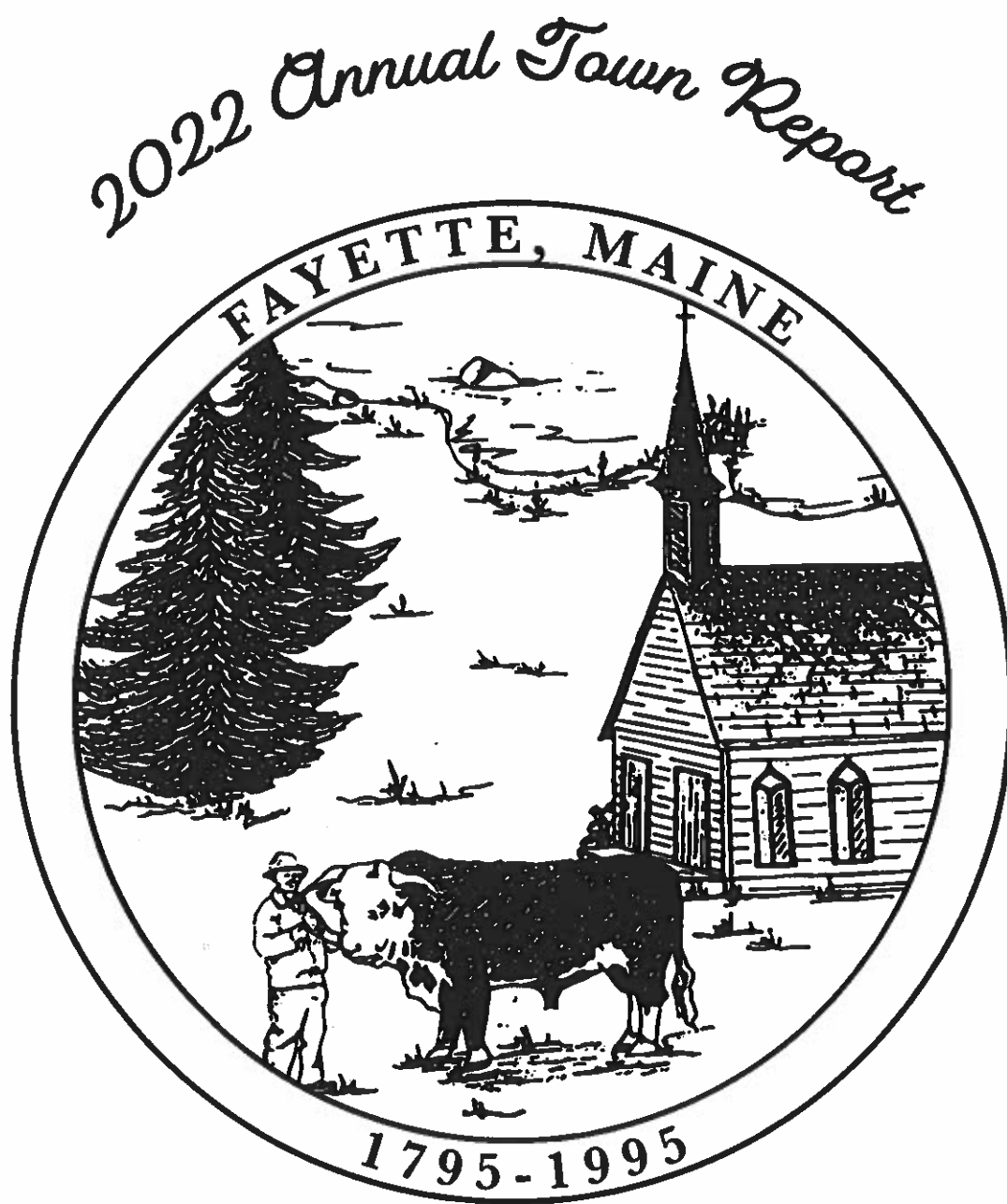

Dear Fayette Community Members,

It is an honor to serve on the Fayette Board of Selectman. It has been a busy year filled with many unique challenges. We have faced uncertainty due to rising inflation, energy, and materials costs but we have made progress in many areas including the property tax reevaluation, broadband and road planning.

The 2022 town wide property tax revaluation was completed in late summer. Tax bills received in the Fall of 2022 reflect the new valuations of all properties in Fayette. Although the revaluation is often not popular with taxpayers, it was necessary due to the last revaluation being completed in 2007. The 2022 reevaluation will allow taxpayers claiming the Homestead Exemption to receive the full property tax relief exemption of \$25,000.

In April 2023, the Maine Connectivity Authority awarded Matrix Design Group a Connect the Ready grant for \$2,569,094 to build a broadband network in Fayette. This will be a privately owned network that will require no taxpayer funds for building or future maintenance of the network. Thank you to Joseph Young, Mike Carlson, Chris Lynch of Matrix Design Group and Town Manager Mark Robinson for their commitment to bringing broadband to Fayette.

In June, voters will consider many important issues including the approval of the updated Comprehensive Plan, a new Solar Ordinance, changes to the Land Use Ordinance and funding for road reconstruction and paving.

I would like to express my gratitude to the dozens of volunteers that continuously contribute their time and expertise in Fayette serving on the Budget Committee, Fire Department, Library, Planning Board, Board of Appeals, Lands Committee and Road Committee. I'd also like to thank my fellow board members, Town Manager Mark Robinson, the Town Office Staff and Public Works Department for their continued dedication to the taxpayers of the Town of Fayette.

In looking ahead to 2023/24 projects, inflation and rising costs will hinder capital and infrastructure improvements in Fayette. We will continue to make progress albeit slower than many of us would like. To counteract rising costs, the Town of Fayette will continue to explore outside funding options, collaborate with local towns and organizations to increase efficiencies, reduce costs, and identify future opportunities. Despite rising costs and limited state and federal funding, Fayette is well positioned to move forward into the 2023/24 fiscal year.

A message from the Town Manager

It is my duty and honor to report to the Town's people of Fayette the important issues, activities, efforts and accomplishments of the Town every year in the Town Report. Herein, please find the Annual Town Report for the year ending June 30, 2022 for the Town of Fayette.

❖ Fayette's real estate taxes were reevaluated in 2022. The resulting impact of this work was reflected in the tax bills that were issued in September of 2022 at a new lower tax rate of \$13.29. The prior tax year was \$18.85.

Please keep in mind the new tax rate of \$13.29 simply paid the following:

\$0.84 for County, \$3.67 for Town and \$8.78 for School

The only way you can control real estate taxes from increasing is to cut spending and/or find other means (revenues) to pay for the municipal, school and county services you receive and thereby minimize the total reliance on local taxation.

The driving factors for tax burden are not complicated although it might seem like it. Simply, it costs money to run a Town and provide an education for a school population that ebbs and flows yearly and pay whatever the Kennebec County Treasurer tells us we owe them! Managing cost increases and keeping the tax rate from large shifts is no easy task. The effects from obvious things like inflation for goods and services that impact us at home also impact our local government and the taxes we pay. Power, motor and heating fuel costs are all driving factors. The idea of cost control is an illusion as most of these costs are out of our hands. However, what is firmly in our hands is the determination of how we grow as a Town.

Managing future residential growth is in all of our best interests as resident real estate taxpayers of Fayette. There are 15 thousand reasons why this is important. Given our current local land use laws, doing anything that encourages and increases future residential development is a really bad idea for Fayette. Here's why:

In Fayette, a modest 2 acre single family home average assessment is about \$150,000. Today in Fayette, that house generates \$1,993 in tax revenue to the Town. Hypothetically, the 1 child that attends the school system from that home is now fast approaching to be a \$15,000 yearly expense to the taxpayers. So, for the people that think the "taxpayers" should benefit immediately from the increased residential development including sale of Town-Owned properties that will lead to such development, I say be careful for what you wish for. It would take a property of \$1,128,668.17 in assessed value to pay for the 1 child for the 1 year at the current tax rate.

Think about why you decided to own property and live in Fayette. For many of us, it was the allure of the natural beauty, the ponds, lakes, pastoral forest, farmland and hillsides, located reasonably close enough to places of commerce and medical facilities, but far enough away to get away from it all. All the stress of traffic and that way of life from where you lived before is left behind to your piece of paradise in Fayette. It is that allure and hundreds of acres of land that can be developed today that is this Town's dreadful Achilles heel. Governing how Fayette can be developed in the future must be the significant priority in the coming months.

FIBER TO THE HOME

❖ At long last it would appear that Fayette has solved the problem of attracting high speed internet service throughout the Town. Thanks in large part to a 2.5 million dollar grant approved by the Maine Connectivity Authority on April 21, 2023. None of this would have been possible had it not been for the volunteer effort led by resident and long-time former Selectman, Joseph Young. Armed with the support of both public and private funds and grants the preliminary work that was done over more than two years positioned the Town to be viewed favorably by the Maine Connectivity Authority.

SUSAN MORIN and GEORGE JOSEPH SPIRIT OF AMERICA AWARD HONOREES

❖ These are long overdue recognitions. Sue Morin is someone that has served the Fayette Central School for nigh on 20 years and her dedication to our kids is above and beyond. George Joseph a long-time resident and has served as advocate and protector from the sidelines for the schools' benefit over the years and was instrumental in breaking away from SAD 36 in the 90's whilst overseeing the creation and construction of the school we have today and most recently stepping in as interim-superintendent. We thank them both for their years of service.

ALL TOO OFTEN TAKEN FOR GRANTED

❖ Are you going to wake up at 2:30 AM to put on safety clothing and respond to a driver who hit a telephone pole on Route 17? Or are you going to leave your family picnic at the beach because someone decided to burn brush and it got away from them on a day when fires were not permitted? There are people in our Town that selflessly serve to address these issues because they care about the Town and the people in it. Yet they are all too often taken for granted and dwindling in numbers as many age out. Few are there to take their place! Thank you Chief Marty Maxwell and the Fayette Fire Department.

ROAD WORK

❖ The approach to road work is changing. It is changing because what was acceptable for lightly traveled country roads is no longer acceptable. Traffic volume is increasing and the need to reclaim, redress, repair and reconstruct road bases in places throughout the Town's road infrastructure is now in the works and for the first time since 2016 the Town will be making a significant investment in roads. Thanks to the volunteer effort of the Road Committee and Town support of establishing a Road Paving Reserve Account there will be work done to curb the decline of some roads with a plan in place for others. It is through the evaluation and production of the Road Committee report that these efforts will be achieved with voter support and thanks to the Road Committee comprised of resident David Hutchins, a retired Maine Department of Transportation engineer, Joseph Young and Selectman Brian Holman.

❖ I am happy and fortunate to have a caring and considerate crew. Many thanks to Crystal Rose, Denise Cotnoir, Jessica Leighton, and Wendy Zamler at the Town Office and Matthew Chalmers, Erlon Schmidt, Charlie Hawkes and Matthew Stratton at the Public Works Garage. Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the U.S. Senate. I am grateful for the trust that Mainers have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to share some key accomplishments for our state.

Last year, I secured more than \$500 million for 285 projects from Aroostook County to York County that will promote job creation, workforce training, and economic development; expand access to health care; improve public safety, infrastructure, and community resources; and protect our environment. To address the crisis of soaring inflation and high energy prices, I led efforts to provide \$2 billion in supplemental funds to the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program. In the new Congress that begins in 2023, I expect to be the Vice Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and will continue to champion investments to support Maine's communities and families.

Strengthening our economy and supporting good jobs remain a top priority. Along with the Governor and the rest of the Maine Delegation and the associations representing the lobster industry, I worked to protect our hardworking lobstermen and women by pausing for six years the onerous federal regulations that jeopardize our lobster fishery's very existence. Another ongoing threat to Maine's small businesses is the shortage of workers. That's why I led an effort to push the Administration to nearly double the number of H-2B visas that are critical to our hospitality industry. Additionally, when the Administration proposed to cut the construction of a destroyer to be built by Bath Iron Works, I restored this funding to protect Maine jobs and our national security.

When Maine Veterans' Homes announced last year that it planned to close its facilities in Caribou and Machias, I opposed that decision which would have had such a devastating effect on rural veterans and their families. I am glad that the decision was reversed, and I have secured \$3 million to help with upgrades to these facilities. My *AUTO for Vets Act* also became law, which will help disabled veterans maintain their independence by supporting the purchase of a new adaptive vehicle once a decade.

This past year, Congress demonstrated how effective it can be on behalf of the American people when both parties work together. A few of the bipartisan achievements that I was involved in include the *Respect for Marriage Act*, which will provide certainty to millions of loving couples in same-sex marriages while protecting religious liberties, and the *Electoral Count Reform Act*, which establishes clear guidelines for our system of certifying and counting electoral votes for President and Vice President.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and I have honored that work ethic by showing up for every vote. During my Senate service, I have cast more than 8,500 consecutive votes, never having missed one. I remain committed to doing all that I can to address your community's concerns in 2023. Dear Friends,

I've often thought that Maine is just one big small town connected by long roads. Well, in the past year or two, those roads have gotten steeper and bumpier as we dealt with an unprecedented pandemic and the resulting economic troubles.

As we faced the historic challenges, something impressive happened. We came together and lent a hand to our neighbors wherever we could to keep things running and spirits high.

Down in Washington, Congress tried to help Maine communities get through this struggle, so that our state would come out stronger. To do that, we put in the work and set some things into motion that are already helping Maine people. That's why you hired us, after all.

The pandemic made something we'd known for a while clear: those roads and networks that connect our big town needed repair, improvements, and expansion – from bridges to broadband. So, while Maine was uniting towards a common purpose, Congress came together to pass the *Bipartisan Infrastructure Law* – legislation that makes generational investments in physical infrastructure, broadband connections, harbors, and the energy grid. These efforts will lay the foundation for Maine's 21st century economy and make sure even the most rural areas aren't left behind.

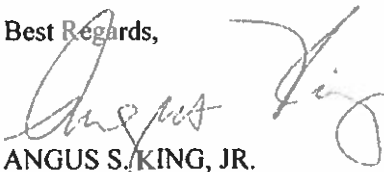
Over the last two years, as we drove up and down our state, you couldn't help but see storefronts in trouble and prices rising as the economy struggled through a global recession. And again, while you focused your efforts on getting through the difficult times, Congress took meaningful action. We passed the *American Rescue Plan* in 2021, which enabled Governor Mills and the state of Maine to better meet the health and economic difficulties of the pandemic. At a critical moment it expanded healthcare efforts to confront COVID and invested in the state to keep the economy in far better shape than most others nationwide.

Congress didn't stop there. This year, we took even more concrete steps to cut costs, create jobs, and provide more affordable, cleaner energy. The bipartisan *CHIPS Act* will bring home the manufacturing of the technical components known as "chips" that are used in everything these days – from smartphones to microwaves to cars – and in doing so reduce prices and create good American jobs. We also passed the *Inflation Reduction Act (IRA)* to lower healthcare costs, allow Medicare to negotiate drug prices, and cut energy bills with new rebates for things like heat pumps and solar panels.

Beyond these major investments, we also passed vital legislation to improve the day-to-day lives of Maine people and Americans nationwide. On a bipartisan basis, we expanded health care for veterans exposed to toxins, strengthened protections for marriage equality, supported Ukraine as it fought off a bloody Russian invasion, secured our elections and the peaceful transfer of power, and delivered millions in federal investments to projects up and down our state.

So, as Maine worked to get through hard times, Congress took steps to support our state – and we're already starting to see brighter days ahead. I'm proud to have played a small part down here; it's a true privilege to listen to you, work with you, and build a brighter future for all the incredible people up and down the roads that connect our big small town. Mary and I wish you a happy, and safe 2023.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. It's an honor to continue serving as your representative in Congress, and I take the responsibility very seriously. I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I've been working on behalf of the people of the Second Congressional District.

In August, I voted for the *Inflation Reduction Act* because it represented a dramatic turnaround from misguided efforts to pass sweeping, ill-designed legislation that tried to accomplish too many things through budget gimmicks, setting up problematic fiscal cliffs in numerous programs and refusing to make the difficult decisions to allow for a fiscally responsible bill.

The *Inflation Reduction Act*, which was signed into law by the president, was fiscally responsible and targeted four key priorities: reducing our national debt and putting our country back on a more sustainable path, lowering the cost of prescription drugs, and making health care more affordable, investing in an all-of-the-above energy strategy to significantly increase oil, gas, and renewable energy production to lower energy costs for Americans, and cracking down on the tax avoidance of billion-dollar multinational corporations. This bill was the first major legislation in the last decade to use the reconciliation process to create a fiscally responsible budget to reduce deficits. The Congressional Budget Office estimated it would reduce deficits by approximately \$300 billion.

As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I also helped pass the Fiscal Year 2023 National Defense Authorization Act, which among other things, included key wins for Bath shipbuilders, UMaine, and servicemembers and their families. For shipbuilders, the bill secured authorization for a third DDG-51 destroyer; established a new contract for up to 15 DDG-51 destroyers over the next five years, many of which will be built at Bath Iron Works; and included funding for shipyard infrastructure. The bill also authorized over \$25 million for defense research programs, including UMaine's large-scale manufacturing program. Finally, the bill authorized a 4.6% pay increase to help servicemembers and their families deal with rising costs due to inflation.

Additionally, at the end of 2022, Congress passed a spending bill to fund the government through September of 2023. The bill funds nearly \$27 million in funding for community projects across the Second Congressional District, a lifeline for our lobster industry that freezes any regulatory action for at least six years, and secures millions in additional funding for the Low Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) to help Mainers heat their homes.

Regardless of the year, one of my top priorities is ensuring I'm accessible to you. My staff and I can help answer questions about and navigate federal programs; find resources in Maine; and resolve issues with Medicare, Social Security, the VA, and other federal agencies and programs. The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office is pleased to make the following report regarding the services we provided to the people of Kennebec County in 2022. These services include the Law Enforcement Division, Correctional Services, Civil Process, Court and Transport Division. We provided many regional assets to our communities including K-9 Teams, Dive Team, Sex Offender Registry, Veterans Advocacy, Accident Reconstruction and Drug Recognition Experts (DRE) and a School Resource Officer for MSAD 49.

While the severity of the pandemic is decreasing, my office shall remain vigilant. We will monitor for potential virus recurrence in our correctional facility and take all recommended precautions to reduce any impact that may threaten those in our custody.

In 2022, Law Enforcement Deputies again logged thousands of calls for service. Our calls for service have increased since 2021. Our geographic patrol responsibilities within the County have increased, as the state police have opted to reduce their rural patrol coverage.

Overdoses of prescribed medications or illicit substances continue to plague our country. My staff responded to 20 overdoses in 2022, we were able to save 11 lives. This number does not include the saves by jail staff in 2022. As the disorder continues to increase, I wish to make it clear that we at the Sheriff's Office will always support our citizens with substance dependency disorders by providing avenues that can assist with their recovery.

The patrol division welcomes Sean Dixon and Eric Thiess to our team. Deputy Dixon has 12 years of full-time experience working as a law enforcement officer. Deputy Thiess came to us from our correctional division. Deputy Thiess is currently at the Maine Criminal Justice Academy attending the 18-week program to become a certified law enforcement officer.

My agency continues to receive federal funds to conduct patrol details specifically related to motor vehicle violations throughout the county. Kennebec County Deputies continue to excel statistically for the number of interdictions for drug related criminal activities.

Through the federal grants system, we were able to purchase a Can-Am UTV and trailer to assist us with our duties serving all of Kennebec County. This tool is available to any municipality or law enforcement agency within the county.

Our Civil Process Deputies serve legal documents on behalf of attorneys, the courts, citizens, local, and state government, landlords and other entities. In 2022, the three civil deputies received over 7,441 requests for service in Kennebec County. This is an increase from 2021 by over 300 services. Some of the services include civil summons & complaints, foreclosures, evictions, small claims, child support notices from the State and enforcement of court orders and writs to name a few.

We welcome any questions regarding civil service to be made to the office. Kennebec is very lucky to have Chief Civil Deputy Harry McKenney, who just happens to be the go-to guy on civil service matters statewide. Keep up good work Chief!

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 1810 inmate intakes. This is an increase from 2022. The offenses committed by defendants included everything from Trespass to Homicide.

Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. We have improved our medical and mental health services at Kennebec to help manage the needs of those incarcerated.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are asked to work and earn time off their sentences if applicable. Inmates who are a risk to the community work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, while others are supervised on outside projects. One may think that this only benefits the county, or our local municipalities, but it does not. It also benefits the inmate population as well.

We are committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims, and to provide enhanced public safety. We acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem nationwide and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education, treatment and recovery for those afflicted with this horrible addiction.

The big news for my staff in 2022 was the purchase of 73 Winthrop Street in Augusta. This building will house the entire sheriff's office divisions which include administration, patrol, detectives and the civil division. Our mailing address will remain the same. More information on the move to follow within the next couple of months. Me and my staff are very excited to move into a larger and much newer building that we can call our own.

As your Sheriff, and moving forward into 2023, I remain committed to serving the hard-working taxpayers of this county, their families and our visitors, honorably, professionally, and by using good common sense and judgement.

The fire department is in need of dedicated individuals to come out and join us. So, if you have some time or know of anyone who does, between working and the rest of life, please send them our way.

To all the taxpayers, our main firetruck that Fayette Fire Department uses all the time is now 30 years old. The Fire Department has kept up with all the annual maintenance, plus some extra work to help extend the life of the truck. With this being said, we as taxpayers need to start planning ahead and budgeting more money for a replacement fire truck in the next 5 years. The alternative to budgeting would be for the town having to borrow more money and to pay a larger sum for the purchase of a new truck.

I would like to leave by saying thank you for continuing to support us throughout the year.

As a member of the budget committee, we try very hard to put our dollars into the most effective use. It is not always an easy process. The budget committee works with our town manager during the winter months to review many of the current needs of the town. Once we have got a general idea, we move into how much these will cost the town. During this time the state starts to give us some idea of funding which again guides us. Our town manager has always provided our board with an overwhelming amount of past and present charts and spread sheets to consider. As our time winds down, we pretty much have most of the information we need to make a presentation to the select board.

The budget committee then votes on the articles of spending and presents it to the select board who then deliberates on the recommendations and makes their changes with conversations with our board. The school board presents their final budget to the budget committee. The final budget is reviewed by the select board and votes on the articles which will be presented to the town at a public hearing. At this point our job is done and it goes to the printer for the annual town meeting.

Saying all of this is important to understand but I will say this year has been very different as of this writing 4/16/23. The clear aim this year has been to take into account our roads. Our road committee reviewed the major roads in town and the report is available for all to see. We are taking money that might have been used for other uses and put it into repairing roads. This is a huge expense and unless we decide to have all dirt roads in town we need to fix the foundation of our road instead of putting another layer of asphalt down. Lastly a special thank you to the budget committee for their efforts this year and it doesn't stop there as all the boards in town do an awesome job trying to make our lives living in Fayette special.

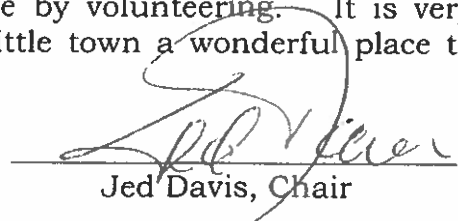
The Planning Board holds its meetings by zoom and in person at the school.

In 2022, the Planning Board issued 10 permits, including for two new seasonal camps.

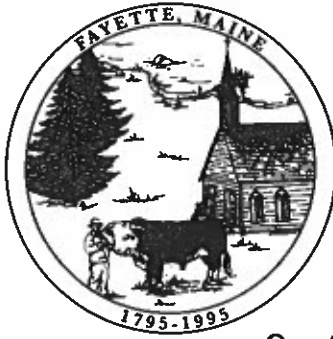
The Board feels strongly that one of its highest priorities is to make the permit application process as painless and quick as possible.

Report for calendar year 2022

Greetings Fayette Residents,

It was a busy year in the Town of Fayette. I have enjoyed getting to know many of you as we have worked together to plan everything from porches and additions to erosion control projects. This is a beautiful town to have the privilege to work in, and great people to work with.

For the year: 60 Building Permits and 3 Notifications were issued.

Of these...

11 were issued by the Planning Board

12 were for single family homes or camps. It was about half for camps and half for residences. This will add about \$1,874,600 in taxable value to the town.

In November of 2022 the Town approved changes to the Land Use Ordinance, making the setback to the road a definitive 75' from the center line, and exempting wells and septic systems from being included in the definition of a structure.

As we move into 2023, there are more changes in front of the voters for the June election, and likely more in November. The Planning Board has been hard at work making sure that our ordinance is accessible and practical. Please feel free to contact the office, attend Planning Board meetings and public hearings, and just make your voice known. I am always happy to discuss my thought process in facilitating these changes.

A few things I would like everyone to remember as they plan their summer projects:

- When submitting building permits, PLEASE make sure they are filled out completely. This includes detailed site plans, erosion control plans, detailed descriptions of work to be done, etc. Please contact the office with any questions.
- Erosion Control is REQUIRED throughout Fayette, not just in the Shoreland Zone. Always include your plan to control loose soil in the narrative portion of the application.

Director and Trustee Annual Report

Year Ending June 30, 2022

Once again, Covid restrictions affected the functioning of the Library. We were limited to 5 people in the building at a time. We were not able to hold any classes or Story Time for this year. We did, however, use grant monies to continue work on the Library.

In June, the Trustees had T-shirts made to sell for \$15.00 each to benefit the Library. They are a light grey with the Library logo and name on the left front in black, red, yellow and white. They are still for sale, so please stop in to purchase one and wear it proudly to promote your Library!

In August, Terry Briggs started removing and replacing the rotted clapboards on the west side of the building. He continued this project into September and found that the left back corner of the building had sustained water damage and was badly rotted. He replaced and repaired that corner. Painting the outside was begun in August and continued into September until it became too cold to continue.

In September, the Library received an ARPA grant. With that grant we purchased two new public computers and replaced an older computer at the circulation desk. We also purchased wireless mice, an MS Word program, which was requested by patrons, and an anti-virus program which was badly needed. Both of the programs will renew annually.

In October, a local resident who works for Dollar General donated 6 large totes full of children's activity sets, coloring books and books for children and adults, including crossword and word search books. Many thanks to her and Dollar General. What we do not use at the Library will be used as give-a-ways at Story Time and other events.

In November the Library was used by a Fayette resident and patron for a job interview via Zoom and a resident of Readfield was in several times to use our computers for his job search, as their internet was not functioning at the time.

The Library was also used once a week for several months as a tutoring site.

In November, at the request of the Fayette road foreman, we moved the drop box on our porch to make it easier for them to keep a path to the drop box cleared.

In December, with the remaining ARPA grant funds, we purchased a new printer to replace the public printer that died, and a CD reader for the circulation desk computer, as it did not come with an internal one.

In April, the Trustees purchased a large canopy. Our hopes were that we could use it to hold events outside if the Covid restrictions continued.

In May, the painting by volunteers, resumed on the outside of the building.

The Library would like to thank the following for their book/monetary donations throughout the year: Karen & David Keys, Doris Morris, Diane Polky, Barbara Chisholm, Sue Smith, Carolyn Currier, Leah Stabinski, Kelli Burnham, Anne Piroso, Cheryl Pratt, Tina Breton, Mel Burrowes, Crystal Parsons, Al & Betty Earl and Marjie Bruen, and anyone else whose names were not recorded or donated anonymously.

If you see them, thank the following for all the work that was put into restoring the Library: Terry & Michele Briggs, Marjie & Laurence Bruen & their grandchildren; Natalie, Kenley and Ollie, Anne Piroso, Doris Morris and Phyllis Rollins.

Since 1988, with the support of 1,100 member households and over forty Maine businesses, the Kennebec Land Trust (KLT) has worked cooperatively with landowners and communities to conserve our region's natural resources. KLT holds conservation easements on, accepts gifts of, and purchases significant lands to further the mission of the organization.

Over the past two years, KLT experienced a marked increase in interest from people who recently discovered our close-to-home lands and 55 miles of trails. As our communities faced physical and mental health challenges associated with the pandemic, we heard many times that nature provided solace.

In 2020 KLT published the second edition of our popular hiking guide – *Take a Hike!* which features thirty-two of our properties including the Baldwin Hill Conservation Area and Cemetery, Parker Pond Headland Preserve and the Surry Hill Community Forest. These hiking guides continue to be popular with community members and visitors. You can purchase your own copy on our website at tkl.org/merchandise.

As the owner of the properties listed above and additional conservation properties, KLT also contributes to Fayette's local tax base through the open space tax program. In 2021 KLT acquired the 120-acre Oak Hill Conservation Area on Norton Road. Stewardship staff, summer interns and volunteers will be developing new trails on the property during summer of 2022.

In 2021 KLT worked with the Central Maine chapter of the New England Mountain Biking Association to construct a network of mountain biking trails at the Surry Hill Community Forest. Trail work will continue throughout 2022. Over the past year, in partnership with NRCS and Ag Allies, KLT started developing pollinator and grassland bird habitats at Surry Hill and pollinator habitat at Baldwin Hill.

KLT offers a great selection of outings and educational events for the public and we collaborate with schools and other organizations to engage youth and share our conservation programs with the community. In 2021, Fayette residents and visitors enjoyed a winter bushwhack at Surry Hill. On August 18, 2022, we invite Fayette residents and visitors to celebrate the dedication of the Oak Hill Conservation Area.

In summer 2022 we will be developing a new parking lot for the Parker Pond Headland Preserve. We ask that visitors to the Headland consider parking in our new Sandy River Road lot and biking or walking to the trailheads on the Fellows Farm or Fellows Cove Roads. If you do plan to park at the Fellows Cove Road parking lot, we hope that you will consider visiting during the week rather than on busy weekends.

We welcome this opportunity to communicate with Fayette residents and the Selectboard about our conservation work. Everyone is welcome to visit our properties and trails and to attend our public programs.

30 Mile River Watershed Association 2022 Highlights



In November, thanks to a generous donor, 30 Mile purchased a building to become our first home in the watershed. In the heart of Mt. Vernon village in a highly visible, central location, the building will provide essential space to help the organization grow to better fulfill our mission. The building has great potential, but needs major renovations. We have begun the process of transforming it to create a new, integrated facility to serve as a regional center for watershed education, research, protection, and community engagement.

Our second year managing the infestation of **invasive milfoil** discovered on Androscoggin Lake was successful. We work in partnership with Maine DEP and the lake association. Because invasive milfoil spreads rapidly and threatens all local lakes, we must continue working aggressively now to control it. May-October, our staff survey the infested area (and beyond), marking each milfoil plant to be removed by a trained diver. Although every plant found in 2022 was removed, we expect to find regrowth in May.

30 Mile staff, alongside 32 volunteers, **monitored water quality** in 11 lakes and ponds (6 in Fayette), completing 80+ sampling events and expanding to Echo Lake. We collect and analyze this data to inform our lake protection strategies, identifying trends in declining water quality before it's too late.

We completed another successful season of **courtesy boat inspections** on four lakes. May-October, our paid staff and 10 volunteers conducted 2,584 inspections (1,849 hours). Although we rarely find an invasive species on a boat or trailer, it takes only one fragment to start an infestation and ruin a lake.

30 Mile is a regional **LakeSmart** "HUB" support center, helping our member lake association volunteer teams deliver LakeSmart education property-by-property and shore-by-shore to create a conservation ethic across the lake community. In 2022, these teams and 30 Mile staff completed evaluations for 30 participating landowners. We are working to expand in 2023, adding more lakes.

Our **Youth Conservation Corps** (YCC) program resumed after a two-year hiatus due to COVID-19. Our crew installed 33 best management practices at nine project sites on five lakes.

We also support volunteer invasive plant surveys, provide technical assistance on roads, and conduct watershed surveys for erosion threats.

Kirstie Ludwig is Fayette's representative on 30 Mile's Board.

Town support is critical to protect the watershed and vital to 30 Mile's success leveraging grants and other contributions. Thank you to the Town and to the residents who contribute individually in support of our mission **to work as a community for clean and healthy lakes, ponds and streams in our watershed**. 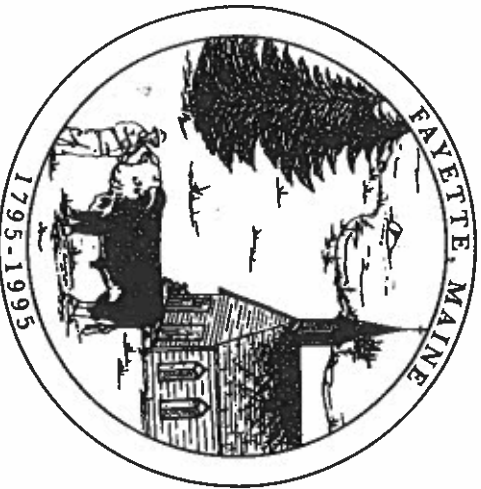

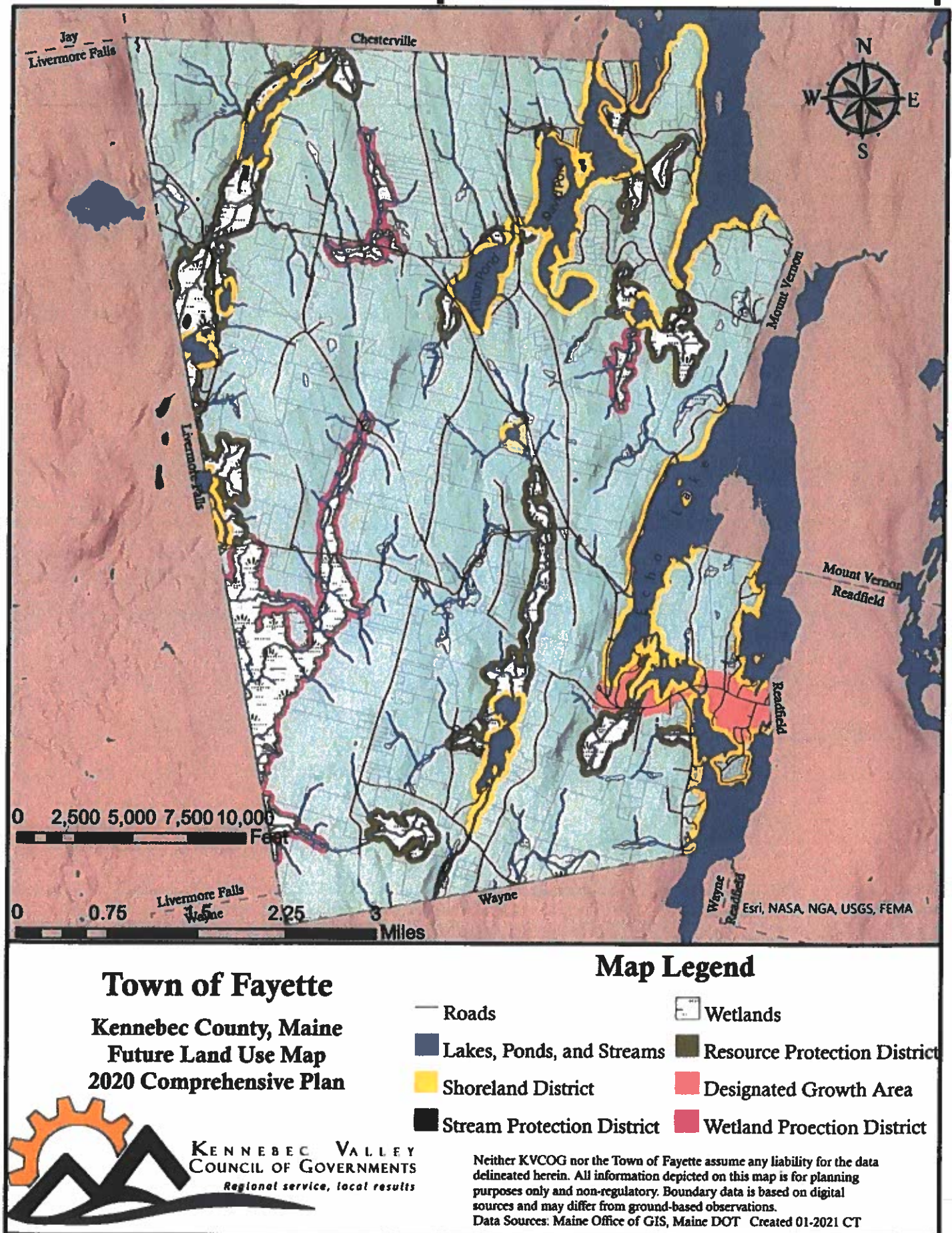
