Town Manager's Report



Greetings All:

Please find the attached Town Meeting warrant articles at the end of this booklet. You will find my comments regarding the Town's financial performance for fiscal year 2010-2011 as part of the financial audit that precede the articles.

If every article at this year's Town Meeting is approved as presented on June 11, 2011, the Board of Selectmen will have the unenviable task of choosing a *tax rate increase* at its regular meeting on September 19, 2011 from the current rate of \$12.75. Amazingly, the Town has sustained this rate for two (2) consecutive years. Unfortunately, we are out of time and can no longer absorb continued declines in other revenue sources - state aid, investment income, building fees etc. - to maintain the status quo service at the same tax rate.

The economic downturn and its inevitable effect on everyone weighs heavily in the decisions that are made at every level of this process. A process that begins with the handful of people that serve the Town. For three (3) consecutive years the employees of Fayette have willingly understood and accepted flat funding for salaries. All appreciate having gainful employment during tough economic times. That being said, keeping good people for the same pay year in year out becomes unacceptable at some point. Both the Budget Committee and the Selectmen have recognized this reality and ask that you support salary increases for staff in this year's budget. The Selectmen have asked for employees to pay toward the health benefit packages in the company of proposed salary increases.

Over the last several years the Public Works crew has worked hard to present a positive presence to the townspeople and deliver a responsive service as the custodians of our roadways. Under the leadership of Road Foreman Patrick Wheeler, Equipment Operators/Mechanics Will Herrin and Charlie Hawkes, have demonstrated a sincere effort to do the best they can to maintain the roadways, care for and maintain Town equipment and respond to the requests of residents in a timely and efficient manner. Wesley Hodgkins' has also assisted the crew as an operator and with his mechanical expertise on an as-needed basis for other times of year. I thank them all for their dedicated service.

In a similar fashion, the Town Office staff serve the people with a warm friendly greeting and an effort to provide the best service possible. Clarissa Herrin (Registrar, Deputy Clerk, Deputy Treasurer,) Crystal Rose (Bookkeeper) and Brenda LeClerc's (Deputy Clerk, Deputy Tax Collector) approach to doing business is the reason why people enjoy and appreciate coming to the Town Office. Even though the visit typically means having to part with their money to pay taxes, register a vehicle or buy a license - at least they know they can do so in a friendly, customer service-oriented environment. I greatly appreciate these ladies and their continued commitment to serve the Town. We are lucky to have them!

As I reflect over the last several months, significant efforts have been made to bring to a close approximately 40 years of less than honorable history between the Town of Fayette and one of its long time residents. The Fayette Board of Selectmen, Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife, Kennebec Land Trust and others have made an earnest effort to assist in the successful acquisition of property owned by David and Roberta Manter of 120 Young Road Fayette, Maine.

At its meeting on May 10, 2011, the Land For Maine's Future Board voted unanimously to fund a \$80,000 purchase of the Manter property for the purpose of public water access to Hales Pond. Regrettably, it will take more than \$80,000 to make the deal a reality. The Manters' cost to relocate, build a home or buy property with a home intact in the Western Maine Bridgton area near their family - will exceed what the State is willing to pay. As a result, private individuals have committed to raising funds in assisting the Manters, so that they may accept the State's offer and move on with their lives, putting Fayette behind them. Anyone willing to assist in any way may contact Selectperson Mary Wright for more information. It will take more time and money for the Manters and the Town to make the Hales Pond Preserve a reality.

Many thanks to the volunteer work of residents Brian Newell of Baldwin Hill Road and Jerry Schneider of Fellows Cove Road both on the Fayette Energy Committee. The committee was formed, and has invested significant time, to identify our energy needs through the analysis of town and school expenditures. As a result, the town received a \$10,000 grant to remedy the continuous and unnecessary use of electricity to run the fuel pump at the school. Throughout the winter, an additional group surveyed the benefit of wood energy products and conducted site visits to the SAD 58 school system, that primarily heat their buildings with wood pellet boilers. Jon Beekman, Brent St. Clair, Wes Hodgkins, Pat Wheeler, Joe Young and David Pollock toured the facilities and were greatly impressed by what their visit revealed. As a result we submitted an application to the Maine Department of Conservation on March 21, 2011 for the Round 3 Wood Energy grant to replace a problem-plagued oil boiler at the Fayette Central School with an efficient, wood pellet boiler.

This effort is ongoing and funding opportunities still remain despite our recent denial for the Round 3 grant. Over the last five (5) years, the town has paid over \$36,218 in repairs to the existing 15 year old oil boilers. The ongoing annual expense of furnace repair is prompting the transition from an oil boiler to a wood pellet boiler - which will also result in enough savings to rein one of our Ed Tech teaching positions at Fayette Central School. The current system will only remain online as a backup.

An annual savings of \$18,000 is estimated to be saved by the displacement of 10,000 gallons of #2 heating fuel based on a price currently estimated at \$3.55 per gallon. Our current total fuel oil consumption is 9,000 gallons of #2 fuel oil per year. The new pellet combustion system will replace 100% of that. The total combined gallons of fuel oil displaced is 9,000 gallons. Current price per gallon for #2 fuel oil is \$3.55. Current pellet price per ton is \$189. The equipment life is conservatively calculated at 30 years. The combustion system is modular to allow for economical long term maintenance.

Anticipated \$ value of savings (first year):	\$17,750
Anticipated \$ value of savings (first five years):	\$88,750
Anticipated \$ value of savings over the expected lifetime of equipment:	\$532,500

The town continues to look at other alternative energy sources. Our Wind Energy Study will be completed by July 1, 2011, and Unity College will report its findings and recommendations for Fayette later this fall.

The town is now a PACE community (Property Assessed Clean Energy.) As a PACE community, residents of Fayette may take advantage of PACE loan programs, that provide loans of up to \$15,000 for a maximum of 15 years, at a fixed low interest rate of 4.99%. The program can be used for a range of energy efficiency projects, including insulation, heating system upgrades, window replacement and other changes. There are no income guidelines, although homeowners need to show in the application that they have the ability to repay the loan.

The program also creates a revolving loan fund, so as loans are repaid, money can be used to provide new weatherization loans. There is minimum energy saving requirements for the projects, which are determined through an energy audit process. That, and other requirements can be obtained by contacting Efficiency Maine or one of the agencies' approved contractors.

The town should continue to explore ways to lower energy costs, minimize the local tax burden for our elderly on fixed incomes and diversify the tax base.

I greatly appreciate the privilege and opportunity to serve the fine people of Fayette.

Board of Selectmen's Report



Dear Fellow Fayettians,

This year seems to have passed like a rocket. Mark has been busier than a one-armed paper hanger overseeing preparations for paving and resurfacing roads to be paid for out of the bond funding. The Fayette Corner Road (Bog Road to us old timers,) was raised up with the help of the FEMA funding and the first road to be paved. It seemed oxymoron-ish to refer to the Bog Road as "the best road in town" this spring! The road crew had a busy winter and is busily ditching in preparation of this summers' resurfacing efforts. We never get enough ditching done but we try.

The discontinued road committee has continued to try to untangle the confusion regarding discontinued roads, undocumented right of ways and a plethora of other issues. We think we have it nearly to the point where solutions can be presented to the town for decision making on some of the issues.

The Board has started reviewing the town's comprehensive plan in preparation for updating to meet the States recommended schedule. One thing that has become very clear to us and budget committee members is that we need to give some serious thought and discussion to our capital improvement needs. Each year we have a last minute discussion on what should be placed in reserves for future needs. It is difficult to make rational decisions when Board members and the budget committee members have substantial disagreements about what our priorities should be.

Also completed and presented for your consideration is an updated floodplain ordinance. This is necessary to comply with changes in the FEMA maps and needed updates to our existing ordinance that has not kept up with recommended changes in previous years. Work has begun to review our regulations protecting water quality in our underground bedrock and gravel aquifers. We may need to make some additions in this area. While we are blessed with plenty of water now it is important that we make sure it is protected for our future needs

We have worked on investigating wood and chip fired boilers and Mark has worked hard on a proposal to convert the schools boiler to a pellet/wood chip system. A grant

application was completed and submitted to the Dept. of Conservation but it doesn't look good as this is written. Mark has also put a lot of effort into a proposal to the Land for Maine's Future program. If it is successful the Manter property on Hales pond would be purchased and managed by the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife in partnership with the town to provide water access for the public. There would not be a boat ramp but carrying in small boats would be permitted as well as other recreational uses.

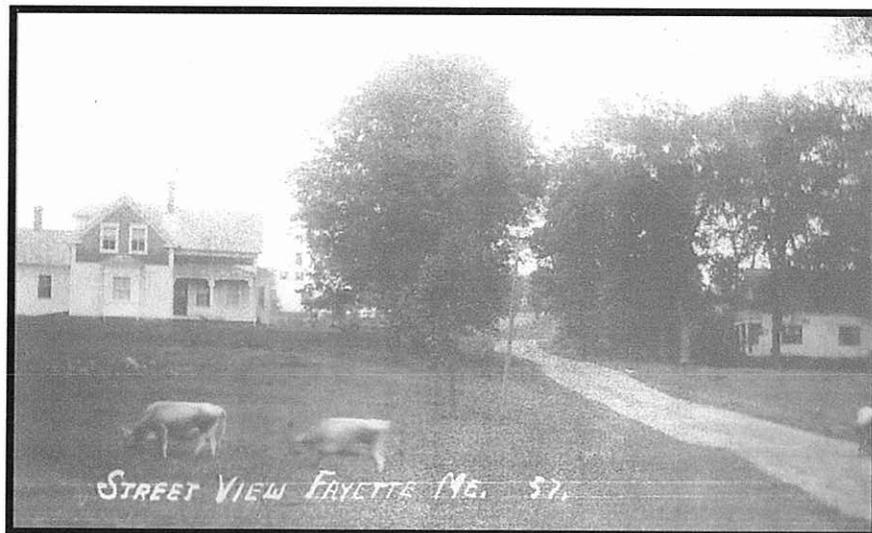
Many challenges face us. State subsidies for education have been reduced from over \$700,000 to less than \$100,000. The Lovejoy Pond Dam is in need of repair and we are working with Wayne to see what it will take to repair it. The economy has not improved and many among us suffer from unemployment or under employment. We have managed to minimize tax increases through cost cutting, use of surplus and deferring purchases. This cannot continue indefinitely. It is likely that we will see tax increases in the future, especially if the state revenues continue to decline or remain stagnant.

Once again, it has been my pleasure to serve you this year and I look forward to seeing you at town meeting.

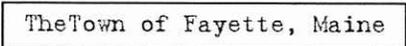

A considerable amount of time was spent by the Planning Board working with the Select Board to get the town's Land Use Ordinance into compliance with the state law. The results of those efforts were discussed and voted on at the Annual Town Meeting.

A small town like ours could not operate without the dedicated work of the many townspeople who volunteer their time and effort including the following members of the Planning Board: Mary Bayer, Richard Jennings, Roy Kraut, Joe Longtin and Linda Seidel.

I also want to recognize the vigorous efforts of our Code Enforcement Officer, Brenda Medcoff. And, as always, it has been a pleasure working with our Town Manager, Mark Robinson.

Fayette Fire Department's Report



Dear Fayette Residents,

I would like to thank everyone in the town of Fayette, for the support we've been given throughout the year. Understanding that the economic downturn affects us all, we have applied for and been successful in receiving a few small grants. Because of this, we have asked the town to once again flat-fund our budget for FY2011-2012.

The old 1956 FWD, Fayette Truck # 33, was taken out of service. It is totally non-compliant in accordance with NFPA standards and, after an extensive search for replacement parts, we realized that these parts are no longer available. We feel that it is beyond time for replacement of this truck. Our 1986 Tanker, Fayette Truck # , has no capacity within which to pump water. It also isn't NFPA compliant; therefore, we believe this truck needs to be replaced. Both have served the people of Fayette and surrounding communities for years. A Tanker/Pumper would be a perfect vehicle to replace Truck #33 and # .

These and other reasons are why we have been so actively searching for grants and more innovative ways to fund the Town's needs. To keep the community informed about the specifications of what the FFVD needs, we will be putting together a list for the desired Pumper/Tanker truck. We are also waiting for word on a recently submitted federal grant. While the grants for fire equipment are competitive, we are ever hopeful to be awarded.

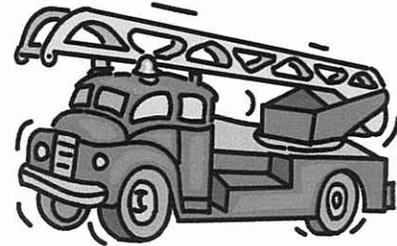

Starting April 1st until the last weekend in November

Burn permits may be acquired at the Fayette Fire Station on Saturday and Sunday mornings between the hours of 9:00 and 11:00 am weather conditions permitting, of course. If in doubt, call the station at 685-9048.

Permits are good for the day of issuance and expire at midnight of that day.

Special exceptions may sometimes be granted by contacting the Chief Fire Warden or one of his deputies.

Registering to Vote:

In Person – bring in something that shows your physical Fayette address

By Mail – give us a call and we will mail you a registration card you may change your party affiliation or enroll in a party if you are already registered.

If you are currently enrolled as a Republican or Democrat and wish to work at the polls please call 685-4373.

Births, Marriages, & Death Certificates:

The Town Clerk's Office records all certificates of births, marriages, and death if the event occurred within the Town of Fayette and/or the person/persons were residents of Fayette at the time of the event.

Certified copies of the record are available for purchase.

The State sets the fees of \$15.00 for the first copy and \$ 6.00 for each additional copy of the same record ordered at the same time. NOTE: For death certificates only, the family is entitled to one free certificate for the Veteran's administration.

Dog Licenses:

Dog licenses go on sale each October 15th for the following calendar year. Licenses can be processed through the mail if you are unable to come into the office.

To license a dog you must show current proof of rabies vaccine. If a dog has been spayed or neutered the fee is \$6.00 and if they have not the fee is \$11.00. After January 31st, there will be a \$25.00 late fee for any unlicensed dog.

REPORT OF THE ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

Dear Citizens of Fayette:

I know this year has been tough for everyone and I appreciate everyone that has come in and registered their dogs, it helps keep your dogs and community safe.

Just a reminder, to all dog owners that all dog licenses expire December 31st each year. Spayed/Neutered dogs are \$ 6.00, all others are \$ 11.00. After February 1st any dog not licensed the price will be, spayed/neutered \$ 31.00 and all others \$36.00.

LD 1587 sec. 3.7 MRSA s 3923-A, sub-s4

4. Late Fees: An owner or keeper required to license a dog under section 3922, subsection 1 or section 3923C, subsection 1 and applying for a license for that dog after January 31st shall pay to the municipal clerk or dog recorder a late fee of \$ 25 in addition to the annual license fee paid in accordance with subsection 1 or 2 and section 3923C, subsection 1. The clerk or dog recorder shall deposit all late fees collected under this subsection into the municipality's animal welfare account established in accordance with section 3945.

CODE ENFORCEMENT REPORT

It has been a very busy year! There were 33 permits issued in 2010, the Planning Board was responsible for issuing 15 of these permits. Four new houses were built within the town adding approximately \$360,000 of new taxable value. All other permits were for additions and renovations to existing structures, garages, sheds, shoreland restoration projects, and timber harvesting within protected areas.

There were fewer building permits in the last couple of years due to an exemption that no longer requires building permits for any construction under \$5,000 dollars. We do ask that people notify the office of what they are doing and provide estimates or receipts showing that their projects are under \$5,000 dollars. It is also important to note that, although these activities may be exempt from the Town permitting process, a state permit may be required for activities within protected areas and activities requiring plumbing. I would also warn that all other rules apply to these structures. This means all required setbacks must be met for the zone your property is located in, clearing for development standards must be met, lot coverage standards must be met, and height requirements must be met. When in doubt call the office and schedule an appointment for the Code Enforcement Officer to review your project to make sure all other requirements are being met! It is less of an inconvenience to have to wait a few days for a site visit than it is to have to pay for something to be built one week and torn down the next!

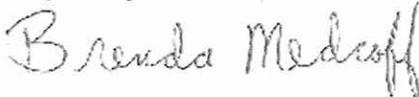
Another note regarding this exemption is that although, my office has nothing to do with your property taxes, these structures are evaluated by the tax assessor and add taxable value to your tax account, which raises the overall evaluation of the town and helps to keep the tax rate lower throughout the town. For this reason it is a benefit to the community as a whole to let the office know what you are building.

Much of my time has been helping the general public plan for their projects by conducting site visits to take measurements and to review the application requests to determine if the application request complies with local, state, and federal rules. A lot of time is expended preparing materials for the Planning Board to review prior to the meeting, however, this helps us to be more prepared at the meetings and makes the review process smoother for both the Planning Board and the applicant.

The rest of my time is spent investigating possible violations and ordering corrective measures for those found in violation. Unfortunately, most of the violations being addressed at this time are violations reported by others, so it is important that if you see anything that you feel might be a violation please contact my office and let me know so that I may respond to it.

I would like to take this time to thank the Town Manager, Board of Selectmen, Town Office Staff, Road Crew, Planning Board, Appeals Board, and the Fayette Citizens for all the help they have given me to make my job easier the past few years your dedication is greatly appreciated.

A Message from Senator Thomas Saviello

Dear Friends and Neighbors:

It is an honor to represent you in the Maine Senate, and I am grateful for the trust you have placed in me to work for the betterment of this community and our region.

The State of Maine, like many of us, is experiencing tough economic times. Currently the state is facing an estimated \$800 million revenue shortfall for the next two-year budget. We in the legislature are committed to crafting a budget that reins in the unsustainable growth of state government, prioritizes core services like public health and safety, education, a safety net for our most vulnerable citizens, and our transportation infrastructure. Despite the challenges we face, this is an opportunity to retool state government, reduce the size of the bureaucracy, carefully review the effectiveness of current programs, and set Maine on the right course.

One of our first orders of business when the 125th Legislature convened in December was the passage of LD 1, *An Act To Ensure Regulatory Fairness and Reform*. The bill recognizes that one of the biggest impediments to job creation and keeping our young people in Maine is the regulatory burden the state currently imposes on business. The Select Committee on Regulatory Fairness and Reform worked diligently with businesses and worked to identify duplicative and unnecessary regulations and eliminate or propose changes to these regulations in order to improve the business climate and encourage job creation and retention and expand opportunities for Maine people. The committee was able to put together a bill that was unanimously approved by its members.

I am hopeful that by reining in state spending, prioritizing our wants and needs and developing strategies for improving our business environment, we can put Maine back on track toward prosperity and create the opportunities that will keep our young people here in Maine.

Thank you for the privilege of serving as your State Representative in the 125th Maine State Legislature. It is an honor to work hard on behalf of the citizens of Fayette and all of House District 83 at the State House.

Throughout the 125th Maine State Legislature I will be serving as a member of the Joint Standing Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs. The jurisdiction of this committee includes: General Fund appropriations and general fiscal policy, federal funds allocations, special revenue and block grant allocations, Budget Stabilization Fund, unappropriated surplus, bond issues, collective bargaining funding, review of revenue estimates, budgeting methodologies, financial evaluation of agencies of state government, Maine Public Employees Retirement System, and judicial and legislative retirement systems, among much else. These areas of jurisdiction hold special importance in the 125th Legislature as lawmakers work to improve the financial and economic situation of the state of Maine and to formulate Maine's next biennial budget.

Among the bills that I have submitted are:

- An Act To Change Health Care Provisions for Retired Legislators. If passed, this bill would remove the health care retirement benefit for legislators and thus the perception that some people have that legislators often run to receive the benefits rather than to serve the public interest. It also removes an incentive for people to become "career" politicians;
- A Resolution to Amend the Constitution of Maine to Change the Schedule for Redistricting. This resolution, brought to me by a constituent, proposes to amend our constitution to remove the existing time lag before the state can redistrict. While seemingly esoteric, it does allow us to more quickly align our state with the results of a census; and,
- An Act to Amend the Laws Restricting Advertising on Public Ways. This bill would update current law to allow for new technology and to improve dissemination of information to the public.

The 125th Maine State Legislature will certainly be addressing many issues that have a direct impact on the lives of Mainers. One way to stay up to date on these issues is to receive my weekly e-newsletter. If you would like to be added to the list of recipients, please send me an e-mail. I also encourage you to contact me with any questions, concerns, or thoughts that you may have. It is with your input that I am best able to represent you.

Maine continues to face many challenges. As I travel across our state, I am inspired by stories of innovation and entrepreneurship, yet there is much more we need to do to improve our economy and create jobs.

That is why I am working so hard to improve our nation's trade policies and ensure that Mainers are competing on a level playing field. I was especially pleased that the International Trade Commission found in favor of U.S. paper manufacturers and their workers who filed a petition against Chinese and Indonesian companies that illegally dumped subsidized paper into our market. I worked hard to support this petition, and the tariffs that now apply to these imports will help keep Maine companies competitive and allow them to create and retain good paying jobs.

Our state is also making important strides in developing the types of jobs and economic opportunities that can only be done here in Maine. For example, when Eastport partnered with a U.S.-based company to act as an embarkation port for 500 dairy heifers heading to Turkey, congressional efforts were able to help cut through red tape and bureaucratic challenges. Moreover, the entire bipartisan congressional delegation has successfully urged the federal permitting agency to begin the process for a long-term certification of the Port of Eastport as a livestock exportation facility.

To that end, I cosponsored and helped pass into law last year the "America COMPETES Act," which will create jobs through innovative technology loan guarantees for small and mid-sized manufacturers. I was pleased that two amendments I offered also made it into the final bill ensuring that when implementing the bill federal agencies work together to prioritize the needs of small businesses and that those communities most hurt by our trade agreements will be given special consideration. There are too many small businesses that are struggling to survive, and we must listen to these independent owners when they tell us what they need to grow and create jobs.

However, my biggest commitment is to quality constituent services. 30 Mile River Watershed Association Report June 2011

Mission: The mission of the 30 Mile River Watershed Association is to preserve, improve and protect land and water quality in the watershed. Its members include: the towns of Chesterville, Fayette, Mount Vernon, Readfield, Vienna, and Wayne; lake associations on Androscoggin Lake, David/Basin/Tilton Ponds, Echo Lake, Flying Pond, Kimball Pond, Lovejoy Pond, Minnehonk Lake, Parker Pond, and Pocasset Lake; the Belgrade Regional Conservation Alliance; and the Kennebec Land Trust. During 2010 the 30 Mile River Watershed Association Volunteers and staff worked hard on several important projects:

Courtesy Boat Inspection Program (CBI): Courtesy boat inspectors (CBIs) are the "first line of defense" against invasive aquatic plants, preventing plant fragments found hitchhiking on boats and trailers from entering our lakes. CBIs staffed seven public boat launches throughout the watershed, inspecting watercraft while educating boaters, with the ultimate goal of changing boater behavior. During the summer there were 7 volunteer meetings and 34 new volunteers were trained. From Memorial Day weekend to Labor Day, CBIs worked 1004 hours, conducting 1441 inspections where 14 plant fragments were found and removed.

Invasive Plant Patrol (IPP): Co-sponsored a 2-day invasive plant identification training workshop for volunteers. Volunteers survey the lakes for any invasive aquatic plant infestations, striving to detect invasions early and implement a rapid response. Our goal is to have enough volunteers in 2011 to complete surveys of all major lakes in the watershed.

Lake Steward Program: Lake Steward, Adrian Polky, of Fayette, patrolled 70 hours on nine lakes, promoting environmentally friendly and safe lake usage in addition to placing and removing speed bouys as requested by various pond associations;

Youth Conservation Corps (YCC): In 2009, 30 Mile River Watershed Association received grant funding to begin a Youth Conservation Corps (YCC) program as part of our work to decrease non-point source pollution and improve water quality in the watershed. Last summer, a team of six local youths was hired to perform runoff and erosion control work on the lakeshores and on other unstable sites in the watershed. Under the supervision of Adrien Polky, they logged in 731 hours, placing riprap on eroding shorelines, creating winding paths, placing crushed stone around drip edges and roadways, planting native plants to create buffer zones, digging trenches for runoffs, mulching a variety of areas, creating 4 water bars to divert runoff on a steep driveway and removing discarded debris from 2 depressed areas where spring runoffs drains into the water bodies.

Based on a "cost-share" approach in which landowners pay for only materials, initial funding is helping us, like other programs, to become self-sufficient. Donations from recipients help to defray the labor cost. Sporting bright yellow T-shirts reading, "Youth Conservation Corps" and posting a yellow sign bearing the same message, the young people and their projects are easy to recognize.

3rd Annual 30 Mile River Paddle Trek:

In 2010, we hosted our 2nd annual Paddle Trek, in which 65 paddlers joined for all or part of a day-long guided trip along a section of the watershed from Minnehonk Lake to the dam next to Tubby's Ice Cream Stand in Wayne. Our 3rd Paddle Trek is coming up on August 13, 2011. Information for this year's trek can be found on the 30 Mile River Watershed Association website www.30mileriver.org as well as in local newspapers and lake association newsletters.

Thank You: Fayette's leadership and financial support have been vital to the success of this organization. We thank you for helping to protect our valuable lake resources and look forward to Fayette's ongoing support.

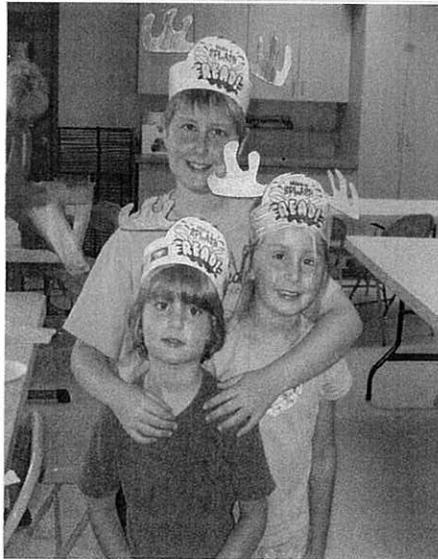

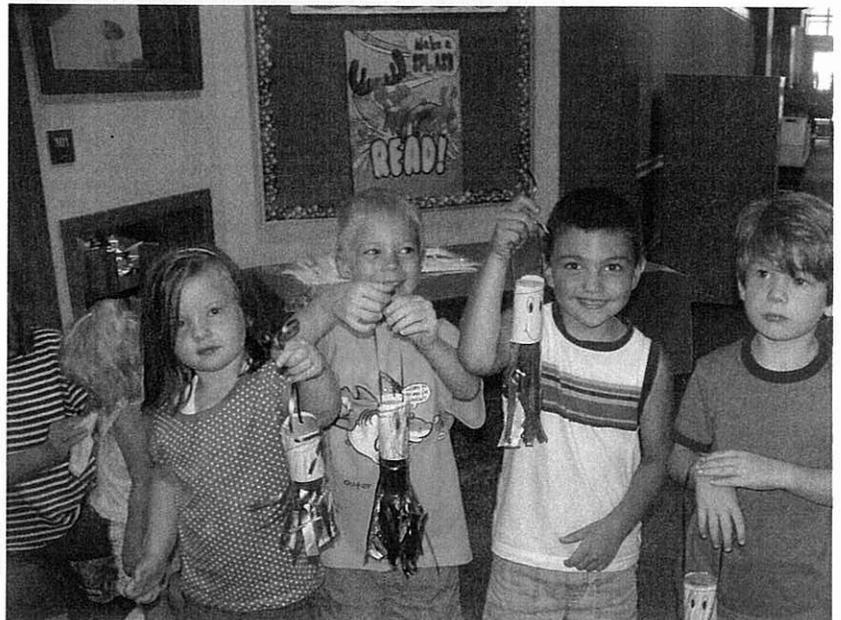

The Kennebec County Sheriff's Office continues to proudly serve the citizens of Kennebec County. The Sheriff's Office has a long history of service, dating back to 1799. Our agency provides a multitude of services, including Law Enforcement, Corrections, Court Security and Civil Service.

In 2010, Deputy Sheriffs responded to 28,776 calls for service. We answered 400 calls for service involving theft; 1,296 motor vehicle accidents; 237 burglaries and 128 K-9 calls. We also managed, on average, 180 registered sex offenders.

During the past year, our Correctional Facility managed 3,725 inmates. The offenses committed by defendants include everything from Burglaries to Homicides. Substance abuse and the proper treatment of citizens with mental illness continue to be two primary concerns at the Correctional Facility. The Criminogenic Addiction Recovery Academy was created this year to provide treatment for both substance abuse and mental illness. We cannot arrest our way out of the growing opiate addiction problem.

Inmates at the Kennebec County Correctional Facility are required to work. Throughout 2010, inmates worked 72,941 community service hours, valued at approximately \$547,057. Inmates that are considered to be a risk to the Community, work inside the facility cleaning and cooking, others are supervised on outside projects. Our inmates raised 28,000 pounds of produce for the inmate kitchen and area food pantries in 2010. Beginning last year, inmates provided enhanced sanitation at many schools, reducing our students' exposure to the H1N1 virus.

I am committed to providing innovative programs to reduce crimes, assist victims and to provide enhanced public safety. I acknowledge the ever-growing opiate addiction problem and have committed to partnerships at the Federal, State and Local levels to combat this problem. Our approach is aggressive enforcement, education and treatment for those afflicted.

I am committed to providing the 122,000 citizens of Kennebec County with progressive and professional Law Enforcement and Correctional Services. I welcome any comments or suggestions, which improve our service to the citizens of Kennebec County.

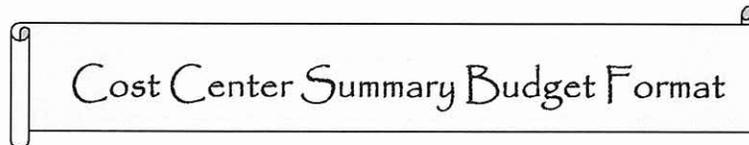

ARTICLE 35: To see if the Town will set the interest rate pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506-A, to be paid by the Town on taxes paid and later abated at 7% per annum from the date of the tax payment to the date that the abated amount is refunded to the taxpayer.

***Explanation:** If taxes are paid but later abated, the municipality must refund the abated taxes and pay interest on them. For taxes assessed on or after April 1, 1996, 36 M.R.S.A. § 506-A provides that the rate of interest set by the municipality to be paid on overpayments may not exceed the rate set for delinquent taxes, nor be less than that rate reduced by 4%. Thus if the delinquency rate is 7.00%, then the town meeting may not set a rate lower than 3.00%.*

ARTICLE 36: To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen, on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate and personal property acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, under such terms as they deem advisable, and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

ARTICLE 41: To see if the Town will vote to transfer and expend from public works capital reserve, a sum not to exceed \$25,000.00 to purchase a dump body replacement for the 2001 Sterling Dump Truck.

Install insulation around base of the building.
Install a metal roof.
Extend the driveway around the building.
Repair tin ceiling and;
Install a bathroom facility and holding tank.

ARTICLE 43: To see if the Town will vote to carry forward any unexpended “Keep Me Warm” funds raised throughout the year.

- (4) That the discretion to fix the date(s), maturity(ies), denomination(s), interest rate(s), place(s) of payment, form(s) and other details of said securities, including execution and delivery of said securities against payment therefore, and to provide for the sale thereof, is hereby delegated to the Treasurer and the Chair of the Board of Selectmen.

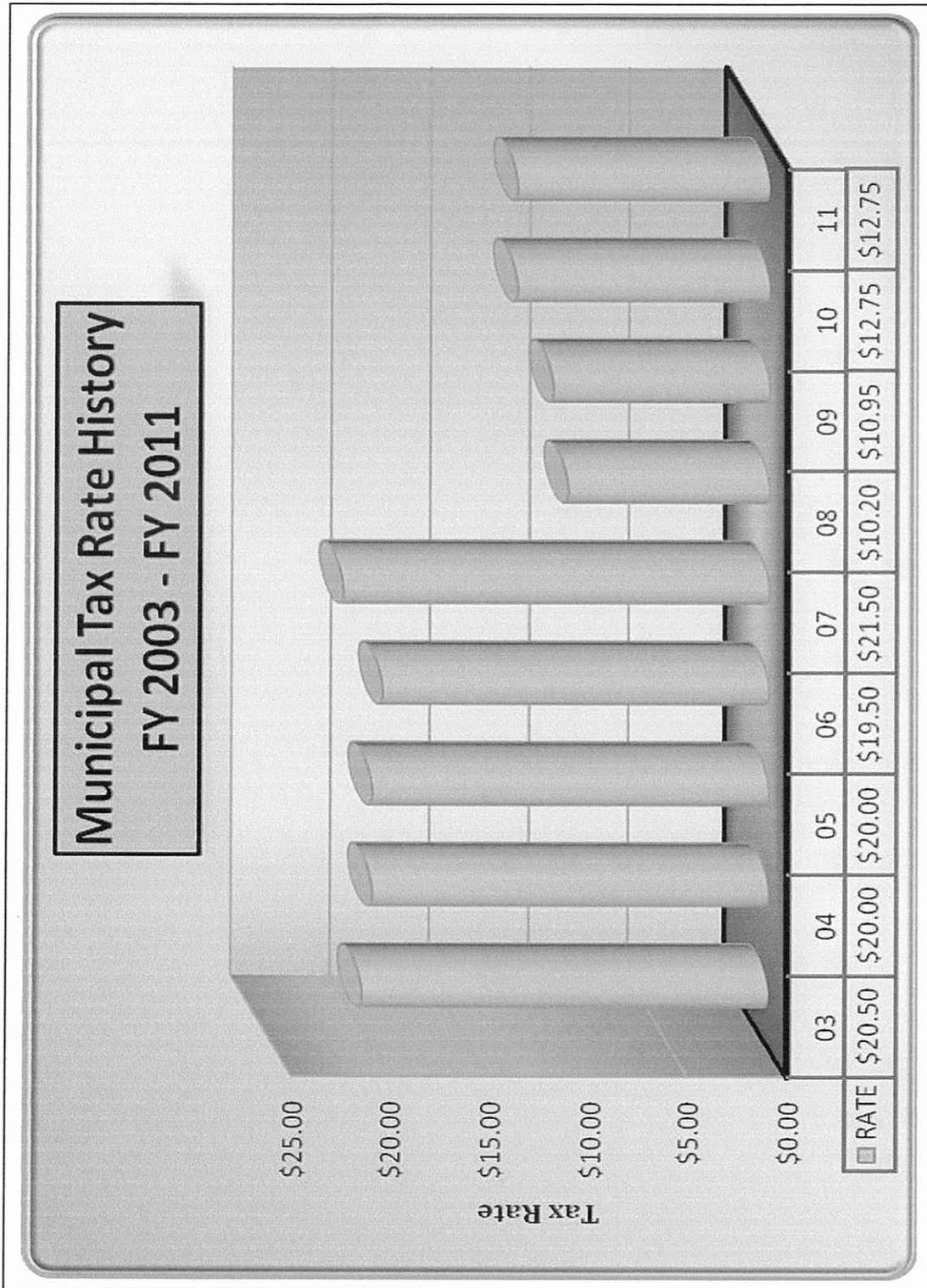

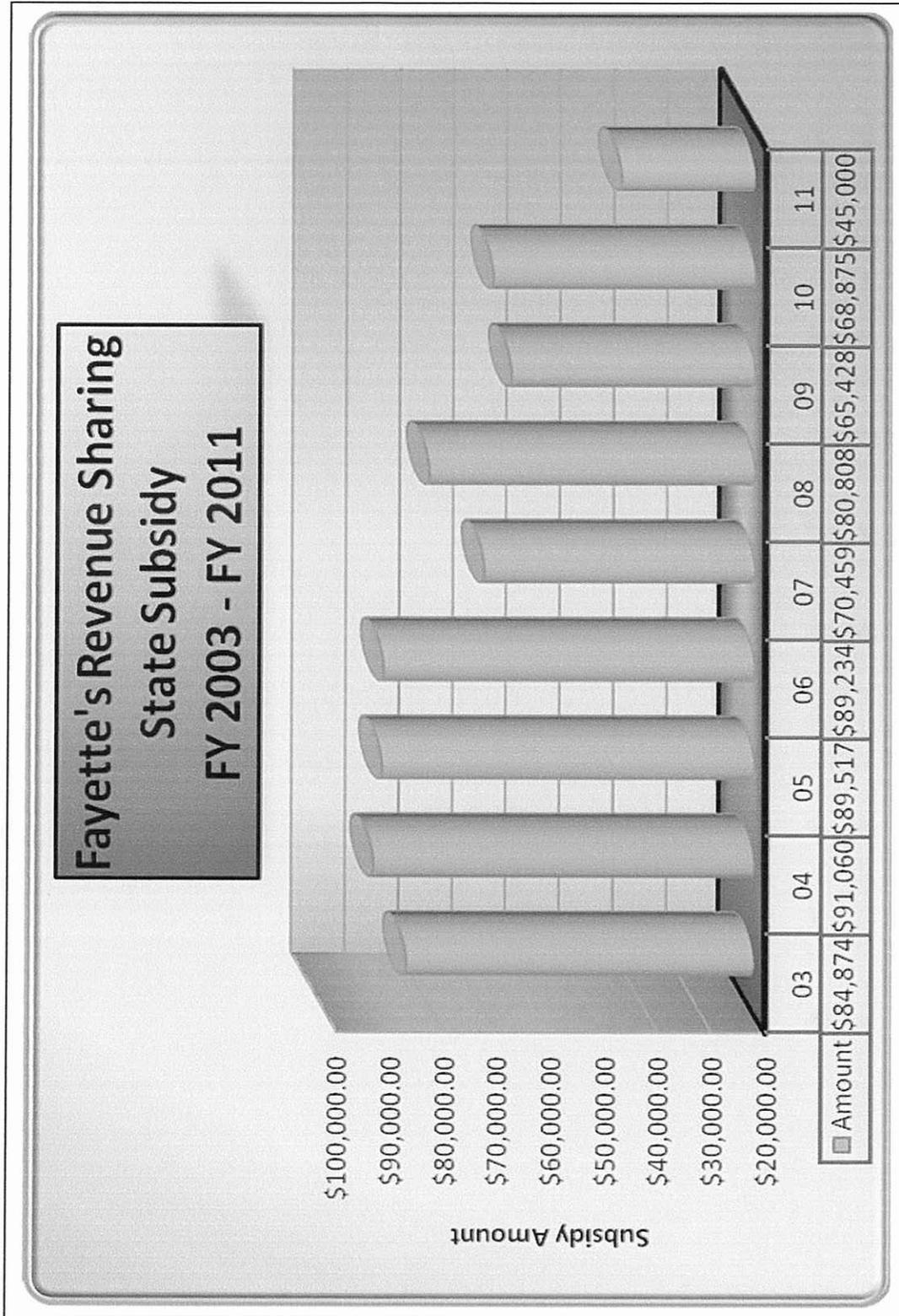

Town Meeting Terms

(What are they talking about??)

Amendment

This is technically a secondary motion and must be acted on before the main motion is voted upon. It must be seconded and allow for discussion before it is voted upon.

Annual Town Meeting

This is the meeting at which municipal officers and other officials are elected. No law requires that the annual municipal budget be voted on at this meeting, although many towns (such as Fayette) do. A "special" town meeting is any other meeting called by the selectmen.

Annual Report

The annual report must be available at least three (3) days before the annual meeting or the annual budget meeting. It must contain (1) a record of all financial transactions during the past fiscal year; (2) a statement of assets and liabilities (including a list of delinquent taxpayers and amounts due from each), and (3) portions of the audit.

Audit

This is a yearly examination of the financial statements of our municipality by a public account to see if they fairly reflect the financial conditions of the municipality. State law requires that audits be conducted annually.

Capped Money Article vs. Open-Ended Money Article

This is an article in the warrant which states an amount to be raised ("To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00"). Capped articles can only be reduced by amendment. They cannot be increased like open-ended articles ("To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate ...").

Excise Tax

There is a motor vehicle excise tax and a watercraft excise tax. You pay these for the privilege of operating the equipment on public ways.

Home Rule

It is the constitutionally guaranteed right of towns and cities to adopt and amend their charters, choose their form of government and adopt laws that are not already covered by state law – or which the state law does not prohibit municipalities from adopting. Home rule is intended to ensure local control.

Mandate

A mandate is a federal or state law which requires local governments to undertake specific actions or provide specific services. For instance, the requirement that municipalities build sand-salt storage sheds is a mandate that must be paid for with local funds as well as state funds. In 1990, Maine passed a law to require state funding of future mandates.

Ordinance

A law or a regulation enacted by a municipal government, usually targeting a specific subject, as in a dog control ordinance or a parking ordinance, or a zoning ordinance. Most ordinances (less than 10 pages) must be posted in a public place at least seven (7) days before the Town Meeting. No ordinance may be amended on the floor of town meeting; they may only be voted up or down.

Revenues and Expenditures

Revenue is just a fancy word for incoming monies; most of the money spent by town meeting comes from property taxes; other monies come from excise taxes on vehicles, and from the state in the form of revenue sharing and road assistance. Expenditures is just a fancy word for outgoing monies or on what the money is spent; most of the money is spent on solid waste disposal, roads and schools.

Secret Ballot

The clerk prepares these for use at the polling place in secret (Australian) ballot elections, which can be for referendum questions (issues) as well as for candidates. Open town meeting towns become secret ballot towns by a town meeting vote to adopt secret ballot voting at least 90 days before the annual meeting. There are also towns in Maine that act on their entire warrant by secret ballot; most others use secret balloting for large ticket items, like bond issues.

Surplus

Surplus is also referred to as “undesigned” or “unappropriated fund balance.” It often results from not spending monies that were approved; it also results from getting more revenues than you expected. There is always a tendency to “raid surplus” instead of raising taxes. But surplus is not a savings account; it is an “operating cushion” to be used only in times of emergency. The rule of thumb is to make sure surplus contains at least eight (8%) percent of the total operating budget for the town; or an amount equal to one month’s operating expenses. The optimum is ten (10%) percent. If you do dip into it one year, make sure you build it up again the next year. Only the Town Meeting can authorize spending the surplus.

Tax Rate

The tax rate determines how much you pay in property taxes. It is stated in “so many dollars per thousand dollars of valuation.” For example, if our town’s tax rate was \$10 per thousand dollars, the owner of a house valued at \$100,000 would pay \$1,000 in taxes.

Warrant

The written notice, signed by at least a majority of the selectmen, which calls a town meeting and lists all the articles or items of business which will be voted on at the meeting. It must be posted in at least one public and conspicuous place in the town at least seven (7) days before the town meeting.

Management's Discussion and Analysis

Town of Fayette, Maine

As management of the Town of Fayette, Maine, we offer readers of the Town's financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of the Town for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010. The Town's financial performance is discussed and analyzed within the context of the accompanying financial statements and disclosures following this section.

Financial Highlights

The Town's assets exceed liabilities by \$4,062,508 as of June 30, 2010, compared to \$4,048,830 as of June 30, 2009.

The Town's governmental funds General Fund Balance was \$552,775 as of June 30, 2010, compared to \$638,092 as of June 30, 2009, a decrease of \$85,317 from the previous year reflective of the town and schools continued use of undesignated and designated fund balance in response to continued reductions in state aid.

The budget versus actual expenditures for 2010 showed a noteworthy unfavorable balance in the County tax line. This is related directly to the accounting requirement and recognition of a 5-year tax anticipation note (TAN) approved during the 09-10 fiscal year. Payments for the County TAN (\$70,078) will be made over the next 5 years. The first payment is made out the 10-11 fiscal year. Accounting principles require that the TAN expense be accounted as a payable of 09-10 even though the payments will be paid in subsequent years. This is in order to be in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), the financial statement for the County transitional budget assessment has to be recorded as a payable. Please see page 23 of the financial statement for further explanation.

The budget versus actual revenues for 2010 showed a noteworthy unfavorable balance in property tax, excise tax, revenue sharing and other revenues. The unfavorable \$22,723 is the difference between last years deferred tax revenue (\$90,000) less this years deferred tax revenue of \$113,000 less \$277 in supplemental tax collected.

A modest increase in late property tax payments were also observed at the end of this collection year although Fayette's collection rate is historically high. At the time of this writing (11/23/2010) of the \$1,955,471 committed to be collected only \$47,352.95 remains to be collected (98% for 2009-2010).

Motor vehicle excise tax collection demonstrated a modest decrease. State revenue sharing also under performed projections. All decreases representative of the economic downturn. The Town also postponed a property sale that contributed to the unfavorable balance in the "Other" revenue line projected by \$35,000.

Management's Discussion and Analysis - Continued

Overview of the Financial Statements

The Management's Discussion and Analysis introduces the Town's basic financial statements. The basic financial statements include three components: (1) government-wide financial statements, (2) fund financial statements, and (3) notes to the financial statements. The Town also includes in this report supplemental information to the basic financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements include a Statement of Net Assets and a Statement of Activities. These statements provide information about the activities of the Town as a whole and present both a long-term and short-term view of the Town's finances. Financial reporting at this level is similar to the accounting used by most private-sector companies.

The Statement of Net Assets includes all assets and liabilities, with the difference reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in the Town's net assets are one indicator of whether its financial health is improving or deteriorating. Evaluation of the overall economic health requires other non-financial factors, such as changes in the Town's property tax base and the condition of the Town's roads, as well as many others.

The Statement of Activities reports the current year change in net assets. This statement includes all of the current year's revenues and expenses regardless of when cash is received or paid.

The Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities are divided into two kinds of activities:

- **Governmental activities:** Most of the Town's basic services are reported here, including general administration, public safety, health and welfare, education and public works. Property and sales taxes, franchise fees, fines, and state and federal grants finance most of these activities.
- **Business-type activities:** if the Town charges a fee to customers to help it cover all or most of the cost of certain services it provides. Currently the Town has no business type activities.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is an accountability unit used to maintain control over resources segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Town uses funds to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance related laws and regulations. Within the basic financial statements, fund financial statements focus on the Town's most significant funds rather than the town as a whole. Major funds are separately reported while all others are combined into a single, aggregated presentation. Individual fund data for nonmajor funds is provided in the form of combining statements in a later section of this report.

Management's Discussion and Analysis - Continued

Town of Fayette, Maine

The Town has the following types of funds:

- Governmental funds are reported in the fund financial statements and encompass essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, the focus is different with fund statements reporting short-term fiscal accountability focusing on the use of spendable resources during the year and balances of spendable resources available at the end of the year. Since the government-wide focus includes the long-term view, comparisons between these two perspectives may provide insight into the long-term impact of short-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balances provide a reconciliation to the government-wide statements to assist in understanding the differences between these two perspectives.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The accompanying notes to the financial statements provide information essential to a full understanding of the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements begin immediately following the basic financial statements.

The Town's asset performance as a whole shows a modest gain following a decrease from the previous year. The Town's investment in a new plow truck and other capital investments, road paving and sealing projects, combined with continued reduction in long term debt overshadowed another year where Town asset decreases in cash balances were realized by use of undesignated fund balance (surplus) to offset the local tax requirement.

Municipal expenses were comparatively flat or reduced conversely school and county demonstrated increases for the year.

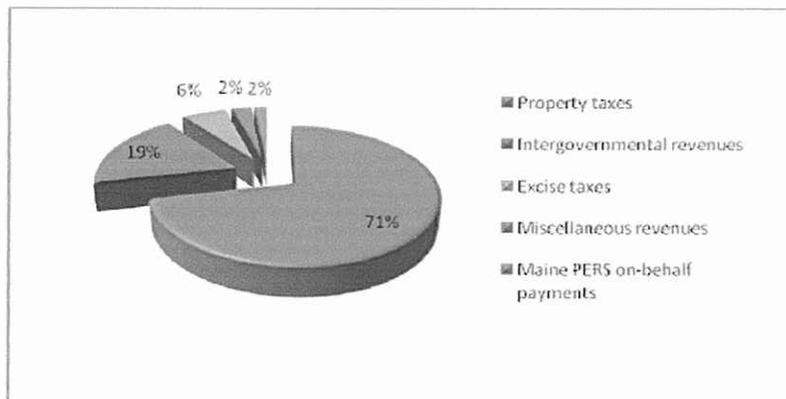

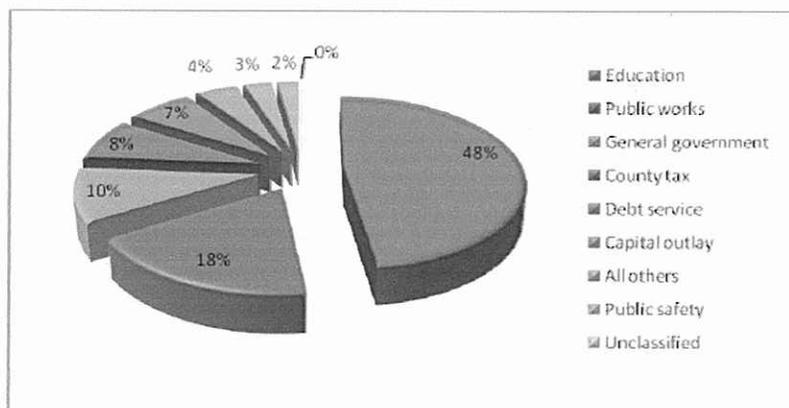
Financial Analysis of the Town's Funds - Fund Financial Statements

The focus of the Town's governmental funds is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the Town's financing requirements. In particular, unreserved fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The highlights for FY 2010 demonstrate another year in which remaining designated funds and undesignated funds were used to avoid historic reductions in state aid while keeping tax rate increase \$1.80 per thousand in valuation and no greater. All remaining FEMA funding was applied to road improvement work including the repaving of Campground Road, reconstruction of the bog section of the Fayette Corner Road.

Noteworthy Reserve Funds Include:

The most significant reserve account is referred to as the municipal/educational capital reserve account. This account is purposed for Fayette Central School capital improvements.

Capital Assets

At year-end, the Town had \$3,259,162 in net capital assets compared to \$3,303,591, last year.

This year's major additions included:

In addition to road improvement work the Town purchased a new plow truck for the Public Works Department and built the pole barn storage area funded by a reserve account established in 2007.

Long Term Liabilities

At year-end, the Town had \$280,834 in general obligation debt and \$140,827 in capital leases obligations compared to \$457,668 and \$65,300, respectively, last year.

Economic Factors and Next Year's Budgets and Rates

The grim forecast remains the same for next year as Fayette prepares to endure more reductions in state aid, no increase in pay or benefits for staff and other cost reductions will need consideration if the Town is to keep tax burden increase minimal for 2011-2012. At the time of this writing the Board of Selectmen held the tax rate at \$12.75 for the 2010-2011 fiscal year.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note A - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Town of Fayette, Maine operates under a Selectmen - Town Manager form of government. The accounting policies of the Town of Fayette, Maine, conform to United States generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The Town applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements. Proprietary funds apply Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) pronouncements and Accounting Principles Board (APB) opinions issued on or before November 30, 1989, unless those pronouncements conflict with or contradict GASB pronouncements, in which case, GASB prevails. The more significant accounting policies established in GAAP and used by the Town are discussed below.

Principles Determining Scope of Reporting Entity

The basic financial statements include the accounts of all Town operations. The criteria for including organizations as component units within the Town's reporting entity, as set forth in GAAP include whether:

- the organization is legally separate (can sue and be sued in their own name)
- the Town holds the corporate powers of the organization
- the Town appoints a voting majority of the organization's board
- the Town is able to impose its will on the organization
- the organization has the potential to impose a financial benefit/burden on the Town
- there is fiscal dependency by the organization on the Town

Based on the aforementioned criteria, the Town of Fayette has no component units.

Basis of Presentation

Government-wide Financial Statements

The statement of net assets and statement of activities report information about the reporting government as a whole. They include all funds of the reporting entity except for fiduciary funds. The statements distinguish between governmental and business-type activities. Governmental activities, which normally are supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, are reported separately from business-type activities, which rely to a significant extent on fees and charges for services for support.

The statement of activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function or segment are offset by program revenues. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a specific function or segment. The Town does not allocate indirect expenses to functions in the statement of activities. Program revenues include 1) charges to customers or applicants who purchase, use or directly benefit from goods, services, or privileges by a given function or segment and 2) grants and contributions that are restricted to meeting the operational or capital requirements of a particular function or segment. Taxes and other items not properly included among program revenues are reported as general revenues.

Separate financial statements are provided for governmental funds and fiduciary funds, even though the latter are excluded from the Government-wide financial statements. Major individual governmental funds and major individual enterprise funds are reported as separate columns in the fund financial statements.

Fund Financial Statements

Fund financial statements of the reporting entity are organized into funds, each of which are considered to be separate accounting entities. Each fund is accounted for by providing a separate set of self-balancing accounts, which constitute its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues, and expenditures.

Governmental Activities

Governmental funds are identified as either general, special revenue, capital projects, or permanent funds based upon the following guidelines:

The *General Fund* is the operating fund of the Town and is always classified as a major fund. It is used to account for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific sources (other than major capital projects or expendable trusts) that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes.

Capital Projects Funds are used to account for financial resources to be used for the acquisition or construction of major capital facilities (other than those financed by proprietary funds and trust funds).

Permanent Funds are used to account for resources legally held in trust. All resources of the fund, including any earnings on invested resources, may be used to support the organization as stipulated by the specific trust instrument.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures or expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting is related to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Accrual

Governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements and the proprietary and fiduciary fund financial statements are presented on the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Notes to Financial Statements - Continued**Town of Fayette, Maine****Note A - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued**Modified Accrual

Governmental funds financial statements are presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual; i.e., both measurable and available. "Available" means collectible within the current period or within 60 days after year end. Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related liability is incurred. The exception to this general rule is that principal and interest on general obligation long-term debt is recognized when due.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Town's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

Inventories

Inventories of supplies are considered to be expenditures at the time of purchase.

Capital Assets

In the government-wide financial statements, capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$500 or more are reported at historical cost or estimated historical cost. Contributed assets are reported at fair market value as of the date received. Additions, improvements and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Depreciation on all assets is provided on the straight-line method. Estimated useful lives are as follows: buildings and improvements, 20 to 50 years; infrastructure, 5 to 60 years; and vehicles and equipment, 3 to 15 years.

In the fund financial statements, fixed assets used in governmental fund operations are accounted for as capital outlay expenditures of the governmental fund upon acquisition. Fixed assets are not capitalized and related depreciation is not reported in the fund financial statements.

Vacation and Sick Leave

Under the terms of personnel policies, vacation leave is granted in varying amounts according to length of service. Sick leave is granted in equal amounts to all employees. In some cases, employees are entitled to payment for unused vacation upon termination or retirement. No liability is recorded for accrued compensated absences at June 30, 2010, the inclusion of which would not be material to the financial statements.

Budget

The Town of Fayette's policy is to adopt an annual budget for operations. The budget is presented on the modified accrual basis of accounting, which is consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

The following procedures are followed in establishing budgetary data reflected in the financial statements:

- Early in the second half of the last fiscal year the Town prepared a budget for this fiscal year beginning July 1. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them.
- A vote of the inhabitants of the Town was then taken for the purpose of adopting the proposed budget after public notice of the vote was given.
- The budget was adopted subsequent to passage by the inhabitants of the Town.

The Town does not adopt budgets for special revenue funds.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Interfund Activity

Interfund activity is reported as loans, reimbursements, or transfers. Loans are reported as interfund loan receivables and payables as appropriate and are subject to elimination upon consolidation in the government-wide presentation. Reimbursements are when one fund incurs a cost, charges the appropriate benefiting fund and reduces its related costs as a reimbursement. Since not all funds maintain a separate cash account, cash is pooled in the General Fund cash account and activity for individual funds are recorded through the General Fund and each respective individual fund through the recognition of a "due to/due from" as appropriate. The due to/from other funds balances are subject to elimination upon consolidation in the government-wide presentation. All interfund transactions are treated as transfers. Transfers between governmental or proprietary funds are netted as part of the reconciliation to the government-wide financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements - Continued

Long-Term Obligations

In the government-wide financial statements, long-term debt and other long-term obligations are reported as liabilities in the applicable governmental activities statement of net assets. Bond premiums and discounts, as well as issuance costs, are deferred and amortized over the life of the bonds using the straight-line method. Bond issuance costs are reported as deferred charges and amortized over the term of the related debt.

In the fund financial statements, governmental fund types recognize bond premiums and discounts, as well as bond issuance costs, during the current period. The face amount of debt is reported as other financing sources. Premiums received on debt issuances are reported as other financing sources while discounts on debt issuances are reported as other financing uses. Issuance costs, whether or not withheld from the actual debt proceeds received, are reported as debt service expenditures.

Debt Issuance Costs

In governmental funds, debt issuance costs are recognized in the current period. For the government-wide financial statements, governmental activity debt issuance costs are amortized over the life of the debt issue.

Revenue Recognition - Property Taxes

The Town's property tax for the current year was levied October 5, 2009, on the assessed value listed as of April 1, 2009, for all real and personal property located in the Town. Taxes were due November 30, 2009 and April 30, 2010 with interest on unpaid taxes commencing on December 1, 2009 and May 1, 2010, at 9% per annum.

Property tax revenues are recognized when they become available. Available includes those property tax receivables expected to be collected within sixty days after year end. The remaining receivables have been recorded as deferred revenues.

The Town is permitted by the laws of the State of Maine to levy taxes up to 105% of its net budgeted expenditures for the related fiscal period. The amount raised in excess of 100% is referred to as overlay, and amounted to \$60,475 for the year ended June 30, 2010.

Tax liens are placed on real property within twelve months following the tax commitment date if taxes are delinquent. The Town has the authority to foreclose on property eighteen months after the filing of the lien if tax liens and associated costs remain unpaid.

Note B - Deposits

The Town conducts all its deposit transactions with depository banks. Cash resources of several individual funds are combined to form a pool of cash.

Custodial Credit Risk - Deposits

At June 30, 2010, the carrying amount of the Town's deposits was \$1,152,860, and the bank balance was \$1,261,944. The difference between these balances relates to deposits in transit, outstanding checks and cash on hand at year-end. Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Town's deposits may not be returned to it. The Town does not have a deposit policy on custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2010 \$0 of the Town's bank balance of \$1,261,944 was exposed to credit risk.

All school teachers, plus other qualified educators, participate in the Maine Public Employees Retirement System's teacher group. The School Department's payroll for employees covered by this group, for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010, was \$285,444.

School employees are eligible for normal retirement, upon attaining age 60, provided they have 25 years of creditable service. Employees are penalized 2.5% for each year of early retirement. Employees, under 60 years of age, who become permanently disabled, receive 66.75% of the average final compensation, reduced by any amounts paid under worker's compensation, social security disability, or similar law. Employees, over 60 years old, who become permanently disabled, have their benefits calculated similarly to normal retirement. The retirement system also provides survivor benefits. Employees are required by state statute to contribute 7.65% of their compensation, to the retirement system. For the year ended June 30, 2010 employees contributed \$21,836. There is no contribution required by the Town except for federally funded positions for which the Town contributes 17.78% of their compensation. This cost is chargeable to the applicable grant.

The State of Maine is required to contribute the employer contribution which amounted to \$44,512 for the fiscal year 2010. These payments made on behalf of the Town are included in the Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balance as revenue (Maine PERS on-behalf payments) and as an expenditure (Maine PERS on-behalf payments).

Note H - Risk Management

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets, errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the Town either carries commercial insurance, participates in a public entity risk pool, or is effectively self-insured. Currently, the Town participates in several public entity and self-insured risk pools sponsored by the Maine Municipal Association. These pools, and the risks of loss to which the Town is exposed, are as follows:

MMA's workers' compensation fund retains \$400,000 of risk and purchases excess insurance for claims, which exceed \$400,000 up to a maximum coverage of \$200,000 per occurrence.

MMA's property and casualty risk pool retains \$100,000 of risk and purchases excess insurance for claims which exceed \$100,000 up to a maximum coverage \$1,000,000 for property and casualty coverage per occurrence, \$200,000,000 cumulative coverage for the entire pool, and \$250,000 for crime per entity per occurrence.

Based on the coverage provided by the pools described above, as well as coverage provided by commercial insurance purchased, the Town is not aware of any material actual or potential claim liabilities which should be recorded at June 30, 2010.

Note I - Budgetary Basis of Accounting

In order to be in conformance with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP), the accompanying balance sheet reflects liabilities for accrued wages payable and the County tax transitional budget assessment payable. The Town's policy is to budget for these items on a cash basis.

Note J - Debt Reimbursement

The State of Maine currently reimburses the Town for a portion of financing costs of school buildings and school bus purchases. Continuation of such reimbursements is dependent upon continued appropriations by the state legislature.

Note K - Subsequent Events

Bond Issuance

Subsequent to June 30, 2010 the Town issued a General Obligation Bond. The amount issued was \$600,000 and requires annual principal and interest payments at a stated interest rate of 3.99% maturing on October 20, 2020.
